

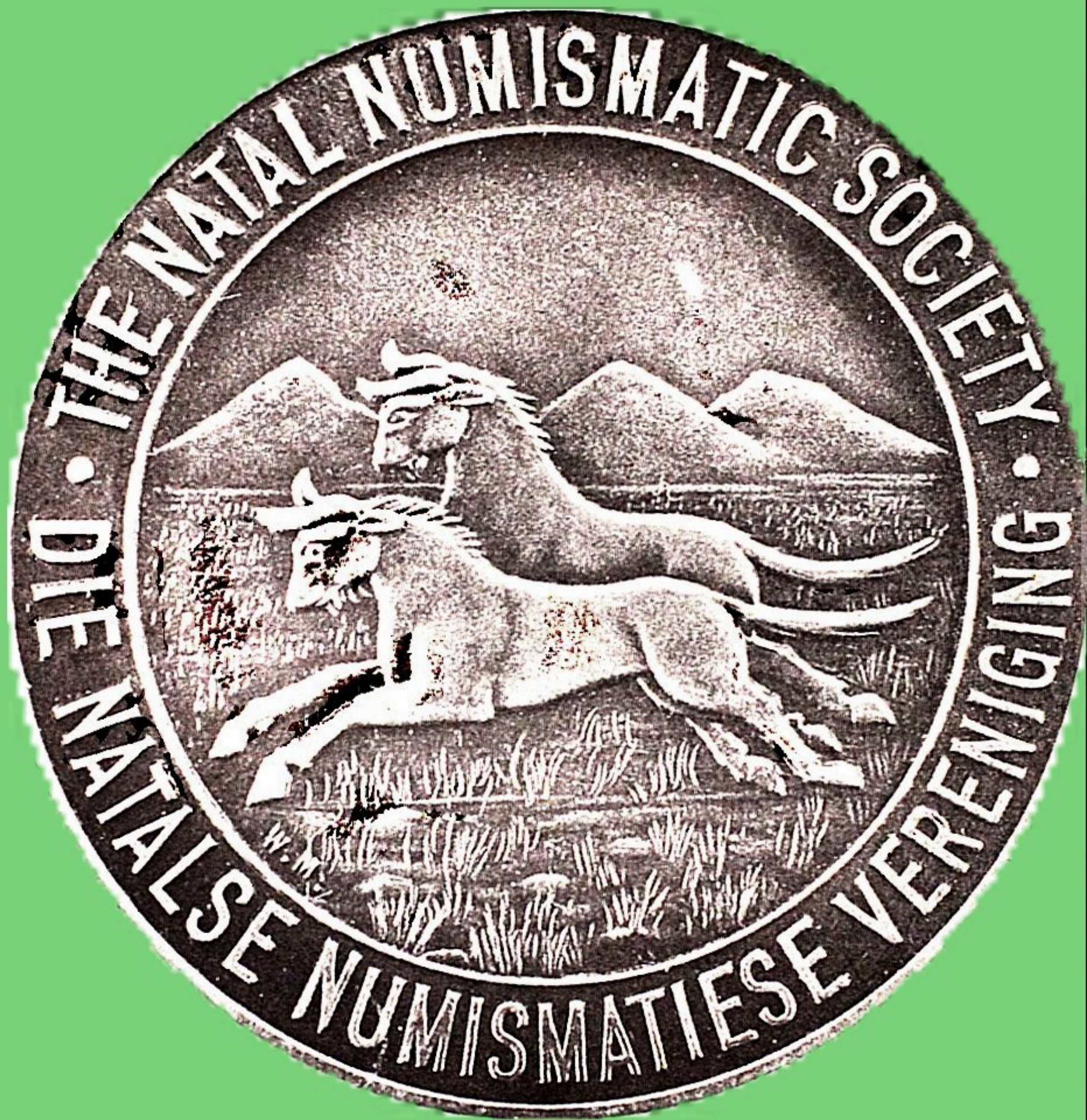

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EDITORIAL

TWO YEARS OF COIN NEWS

Two years ago this month the first issue of Bickels Coin and Medal News was issued. The magazine had its origin in the intense numismatic fever which gripped the country during the introduction of a totally new series of coins. During those hectic months, when millions of collectors here and overseas chased a comparative handful of proof sets (25,000) issued by the South African Mint, prices soared and the hobby gripped the imagination of thousands of South Africans.

This, in reality, was the birth of popular South African numismatics. There had always been the hard core of collectors who, during the years, built up impressive collections of local and foreign coins. Like any passing fad, many who sought only profits soon dropped out of the hobby, believing they were misled. Those who stayed have, for the most part, completely changed their outlook. The fervent speculators who bought to sell for a few rand profit have now become dedicated numismatists set

on building up splendid collections of Kruger and South African coins, medals and commemorative medallions.

The number of collectors we know who used to boast of their profit margins and now gloat about the conditions of their coins is vast.

We like to believe that over the past 24 months we may, in some small way, be responsible for introducing a trend towards serious numismatic study and collecting. Although we only claim to be the means by which knowledge is transmitted from one collector to thousands of others, we feel that the real tributes must be paid to our contributors.

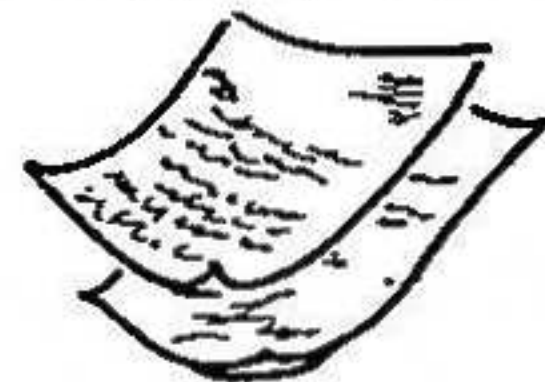
Over the months they, by hours of intense research, have added invaluable historical facts to South African numismatic learning. We know that had it not been for articles like H.C. Philipson's complete history of South African Crowns and Stan & Lilian Kaplan's research

into the coins of German East Africa, it is possible that in years to come facts which are now recorded, for future generations may have been forgotten and overlooked.

To celebrate our birthday, we have devoted five pages to a complete "Check List" of official South African Medals by the well-known numismatist, Dr. Frank Mitchell, of Cape Town. We know that this will be a standard reference work for medal collectors. The mere fact that it has appeared in print will be an inducement to many people to interest themselves in medals.

During the next 12 months we will follow our policy of publishing anything worthwhile of numismatic interest. We rely on you, the numismatist, to help us achieve our goal.

Numismatic medals

No organization is more suited to bring out a commemorative medallion than a numismatic society.

The Transvaal Numismatic Society set the trend seven years ago with a beautifully engraved and struck medallion to mark South Africa's first Numismatic Coin Convention.

Two months ago the Natal Numismatic Society announced that it would sell 300 bronze, 200 silver and 50 gold medallions to mark the third South African Numismatic Convention which will be held in Durban from 11th to the 15th of this month. The medallions sell at R3.00 for the bronze, R6.00 for the silver and R90.00 for the gold.

The Orange Free State Numismatic Society has produced a remarkably attractive medallion to celebrate the founding of that society last year. More details about the medallions and their prices can be obtained from the O.F.S. Numismatic Society, P.O. Box 277, Odendaalsrus.

The three medallions show a high degree of workmanship and are a reflection of the ingenuity and trouble which has gone into their production by members of the three societies.

The Free State medallion is particularly striking with the Orange Free State Coat of Arms on the obverse and the wreath of mimosa surrounding a Roman five on the reverse.

Chichester medal



Medals commemorating Sir Francis Chichester's single-handed voyage round the world in his yacht "Gipsy Moth IV" will be struck in two sizes in platinum, gold and silver, and will be on sale to the general public.

The medals are designed by Mr. Paul Vincze. The obverse shows Sir Francis, wearing his famous yachting cap, against a background of rigging. The reverse shows Neptune, with "Gipsy Moth IV" and Sir Francis Drake's famous ship the "Golden Hind", against the background of the globe. The inscription reads: "Gipsy Moth IV 1966-67; Golden Hind 1577-80".

Munte van Griqualand

Die stigting van 'n Christelike sendingstasie by Klarwater het sy oorsprong gehad in 'n deputasie van Baster-Hottentotte wat in 1799 by drie sendelinge van die „London Missionary Society“ wat toe net in Kaapstad gearriveer het, gaan pleit, om hulle mense wat by Klarwater gevestig was, te help. Die sendelinge het na die Kaap gekom met die doel om in die Kaffrariase gebied by die Zakrivier, sendingstasies te stig.

Eers vier jaar later is 'n sendingstasie by Klarwater, noord van die Oranjerivier, gestig. Dit is die gebied van die huidige Kimberley. (Let Wel: daar is ook 'n Klarwater naby Vredendal, aan die Noordwes Kaapse Kus.)

Die Baster-Hottentotte het voor die stigting van die sendingstasie hoofsaaklik van jag en diefstal geleef. In 1804 laat vaar hulle egter hulle nomadiese bestaan en onder leiding van 'n sendeling vestig hulle hul op een bepaalde plek waar hulle geleer word om klere te dra soos die blanke, geboue op te rig en landbou te beoefen, m.a.w. al die voordele van die Westerse beskawing word aan hulle beskikbaar gestel.

In 1813 besoek 'n direkteur van die „London Missionary Society“, Eerw. John Campbell, Suid-Afrika op 'n inspeksiereis. In sy boek wat in 1815 gepubliseer is nl. „Travels in South Africa undertaken at the request of the London Missionary Society“, skryf hy dat 'n vergadering gehou is waar al die manlike inwoners van die nedersetting te Klarwater teenwoordig was. Hulle besluit onder sy leiding, dat wette ingestel sal word om hulle self en hul besittings te beveilig. Daar word ook besluit om die benaming „Basters“ te verander na „Griekwas“. Die hoofdorp, Klarwater, se naam word ook verander na Griekwastad en die gebied was bekend as Griekwaland-Wes.

Op 13 Februarie 1814 keer Eerw. Campbell terug na Engeland en laat op eie inisiatief munte van vier waardes vir die Griekwas slaan, wat

dit die eerste en enigste sendinggeld maak wat nog ooit geslaan en gebruik is. Dit het bestaan uit twee silwer muntstukke, die 10d en 5d en twee brons muntstukke nl. die ½d en ¼d wat in twee besendings in 1815 en 1816 onderskeidelik vanaf Londen ontvang is. Die afwesigheid van 'n datum op die munte dui aan dat die stempels bedoel was vir verdere gebruik totdat hulle verslete raak. Hierdie stempels is vir twee jaar lank gebruik, daarna is die oorgrote meerderheid Griekwamunte opgesmelt net 'n klein hoeveelheid van hulle het behoue gebly. Sover bekend is daar net een variasie nl. op die keersy van die 5d en ¼d. Dieselfde stempel is vir die keersy van hierdie twee munte gebruik. 'n Klein verskil is sigbaar in die vorm van die olyftakkie wat die duif in sy bek hou en kan moontlik daarop dui dat die een stempel gebreek het en toe vervang is.

Die brons muntstukke is skaarser as die van silwer en daaruit kan moontlik afgelei word dat minder brons munte geslaan is, waarskynlik omdat die Griekwas die blinker munte verkies het bo die dowwer brons stukke.

Die graveerder van die Griekwageld, Thomas Halliday, was bekend in daardie tydperk. Hy het o.a. ook medaljes soos die anti-slawe medaljes, herdenkingsmedaljes van Prinses Charlotte in 1816 en 'n William Pitt-medalje gegraveer.

Deur droogtes en plaaslike opstande is die sendingstasie in ongeveer 1818 ontruim en die Griekwas se welvarende lewe was iets van die

verlede.

In 1863 trek hulle na Griekwaland-Oos tot by Mount Currie, naby Kokstad, op die suidelike grens van Natal. Dit het as gevolg gehad dat hulle Britse onderdane geword het, alhoewel hulle nog hul eie Volksraad gehad het. In 1867 besluit die Volksraad van Adam Kok om papiergeld te druk, maar dit het nooit in sirkulasie gekom nie. Die Nasionale Kultuurhistoriese en Opelugmuseum in Pretoria is in besit van 'n hele aantal van hierdie banknote, wat ongedateer en ongeteken is. Die banknote is deur Saul Solomon & Kie van Kaapstad gedruk.

'n Voorstel is in 1876 deur die regering van Griekwaland-Wes gemaak vir die ingebruikneming van nikkel pennies en halfpennies. Hierdie voorgestelde nikkel munte sou agtkantig wees om verwarring te voorkom met die silwer geld wat toe gebruik is in ander dele van die land. Die munte sou geen benaming hê nie, wat die gebruik daarvan in die res van die land moontlik sou maak indien nodig. Die Britse Regering keur die aanbeveling egter af op grond daarvan dat nikkel te duur is. Hulle stel voor dat geld van Natal gebruik word, maar hierdie voorstel is nooit tot uitvoering gebring nie.

Gedurende 1890 is brons proefpennies geslaan met Koningin Victoria se „jongkop“ daarop sonder die kroon. Op die keersy is dieselfde duifontwerp met 'n olyftakkie in die bek, as die keersy-ontwerp wat op die Griekwa-munte verskyn het.

'n Stel Griekwamunte is deur Mnr. De Villiers Roos, voormalige Kontroleur en Ouditeur-generaal van die Unie van Suid-Afrika, aan die Museum nagelaat. Die 5d-stuk is deur hom in ongeveer 1925 op 'n Londense veiling aangekoop teen die bedrag van £4, wat toe al ontsettend hoog vir die munt was.

Het u al die verskil gesien in die syfers op die 1962 20c stuk?

Eerste Sjinese Boot Om Die Kaap

Die Nasionale Kultuurhistoriese en Opelugmuseum in Pretoria het onlangs 'n baie seldsame stukkie Afrikana op 'n Johannesburgse veiling aangekoop. Dit is naamlik 'n pragtige medalje, ongeveer 2 duim in deursnee wat uitgereik is ter ere van die eerste Sjinese skip, 'n goeie seevarende boot, wat in 1848 in die Kaapse hawe geanker het. Dit was dan ook die eerste keer dat Sjina 'n boot na Europa gestuur het. Hierdie boot „Keying" was 160 vt. lank, 33 vt. breed en die diepte van haar ruim was 16 vt. Die skip het eers vanaf Boston V.S.A. na Jersey gevaar in 21 dae en het op 27 Maart 1848 in Engeland aangekom en daarna om die Kaap gevaar.

Die bogenoemde geskiedenis verskyn op die medalje.

Moontlik is hierdie medalje, nadat dit in Engeland geslaan is, aangebied by al die hawes waar die boot aangedoen het.

Die makersmerk op die medalje is „Allen en Moore, Birmingham". Hierdie firma was beskou as die beste medalje-makers van die 19de eeu. Joseph Moore is gebore op 17 Februarie 1817 en is in September 1892 oorlede. Hy het eers 'n besigheid saam met Allen gehad, maar sy latere medaljes is net „J. Moore" geteken.

A 'Check-list' of Campaign Medals of S. African Interest

The question is often asked by the growing number of collectors of South African Military Medals and Decorations: "Just what medals should be included in a collection of South African Military Medals?"

I have tried to answer that question by setting out a "Check List" of all medals which have come to my notice, and which have been awarded to South Africans or are of direct South African interest. The first section of my list — that dealing with Campaign Medals — is now presented. Further instalments dealing with Decorations; Long Service awards; and Military Commemoratives will, I hope, follow in due course. The object is to cover all medals and decorations which South African servicemen have been entitled to wear in uniform — plus one or two others of special importance, such as the medal for O'okiep, which should not be so worn.

It will be observed that for the purposes of this list, my definition of "South Africa" includes Southern Rhodesia and the former High Commission Territories, but excludes South West Africa, Mocambique, Angola and Northern Rhodesia.

This list may not be complete. I shall be exceedingly grateful to any reader who can add to it, particularly if a detailed description supported by photographs of any additional medal encountered is supplied to me.

Newcomers to medal collecting should remember that there are many pitfalls in our branch of the hobby. One finds medals which have been renamed; have had bars added or subtracted or substituted; have had ranks or units changed; or have been otherwise "doctored". In my view, a "fiddled" medal has no place in a collection, but should be consigned to the melting pot. To recognise the fiddled medal may not be easy, and takes years of experience. I still slip up occasionally myself!! In the meantime I can only advise the beginner not to pay "rarity" prices for so-called rare medals, unless he has first taken his "bargain" to an experienced colleague for vetting.

For further details of many of the medals listed I recommend "Ribbons and Medals" by Dorling, and "British Battles and Medals" by L.L. Gordon. In addition, "The Armed Forces of South Africa" by Tylden is invaluable for its description of South African Campaigns and South African units.

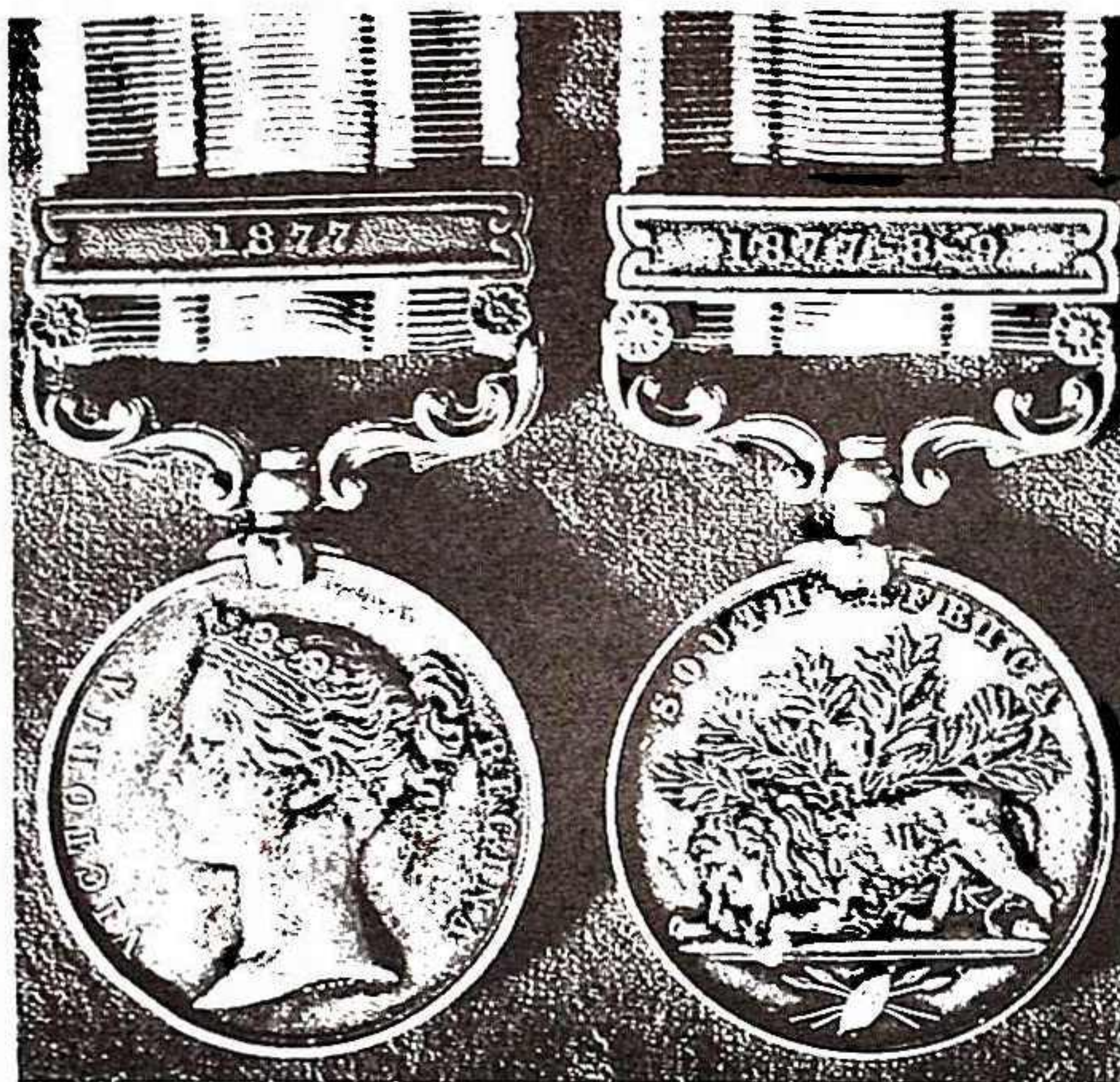
F.K. Mitchell, J.C.D., M.B., CH.B., D.P.H., F.R.S.H.

Dr. Francis Kerr Mitchell has collected coins for almost half a century. At his suggestion the S.A. Numismatic Society started its "Newsletter" in 1948. He was elected Honorary Editor — a post which he has held ever since. Over the years, the Newsletter, which became the South African Numismatic Journal, has been the medium for placing on record a vast amount of original Africana numismatic research, much of it from his own pen.

He has been President of the S.A. Numismatic Society on many occasions, and was a Foundation Member of the Johannesburg Numismatic Society. He is now a member of the Transvaal and Natal Societies.

Frank Mitchell's collection covers almost the whole field of Africana numismatics, including the currency of the Early Cape, the British coinage of 1800 to 1923, and South African Commemoratives and Tokens. It is particularly strong in the Kruger series, and in the coins and specimen sets of the Union.

He has contributed numismatic articles not only to the Newsletter and Journal of the South African Numismatic Society, but to De Nummis, the Journal of the Transvaal Numismatic Society; to "Africana Notes and News"; and to several overseas publications. For the past 18 months he has written a weekly numismatic column for a well-known Afrikaans Daily Newspaper.



The Medal for South Africa, 1877-9 obverse and reverse, with rare bar 1877, and bar 1877-8-9.

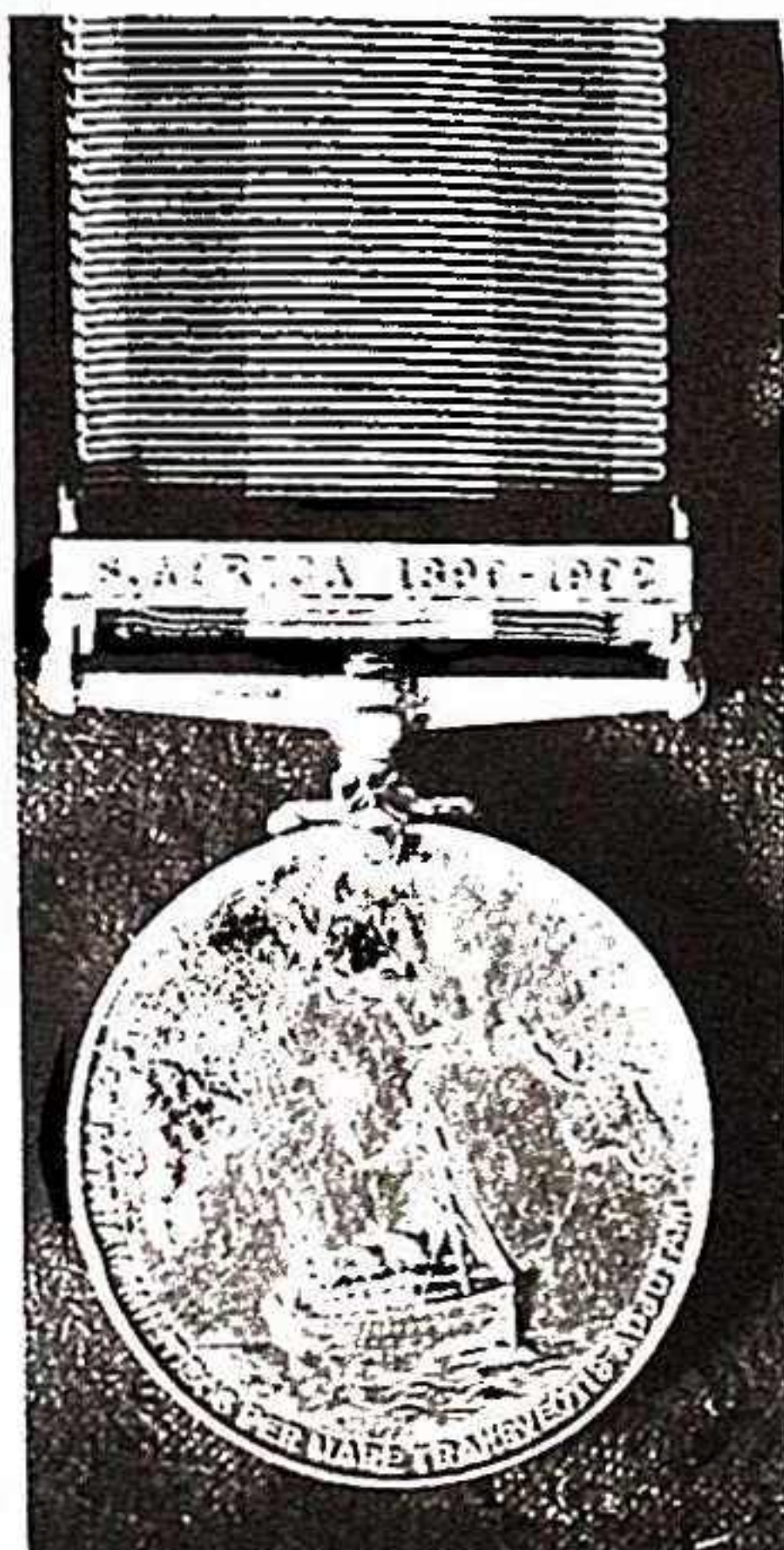


The Cape of Good Hope General Service. 2 bars: Transkei & Basutoland. Reverse.

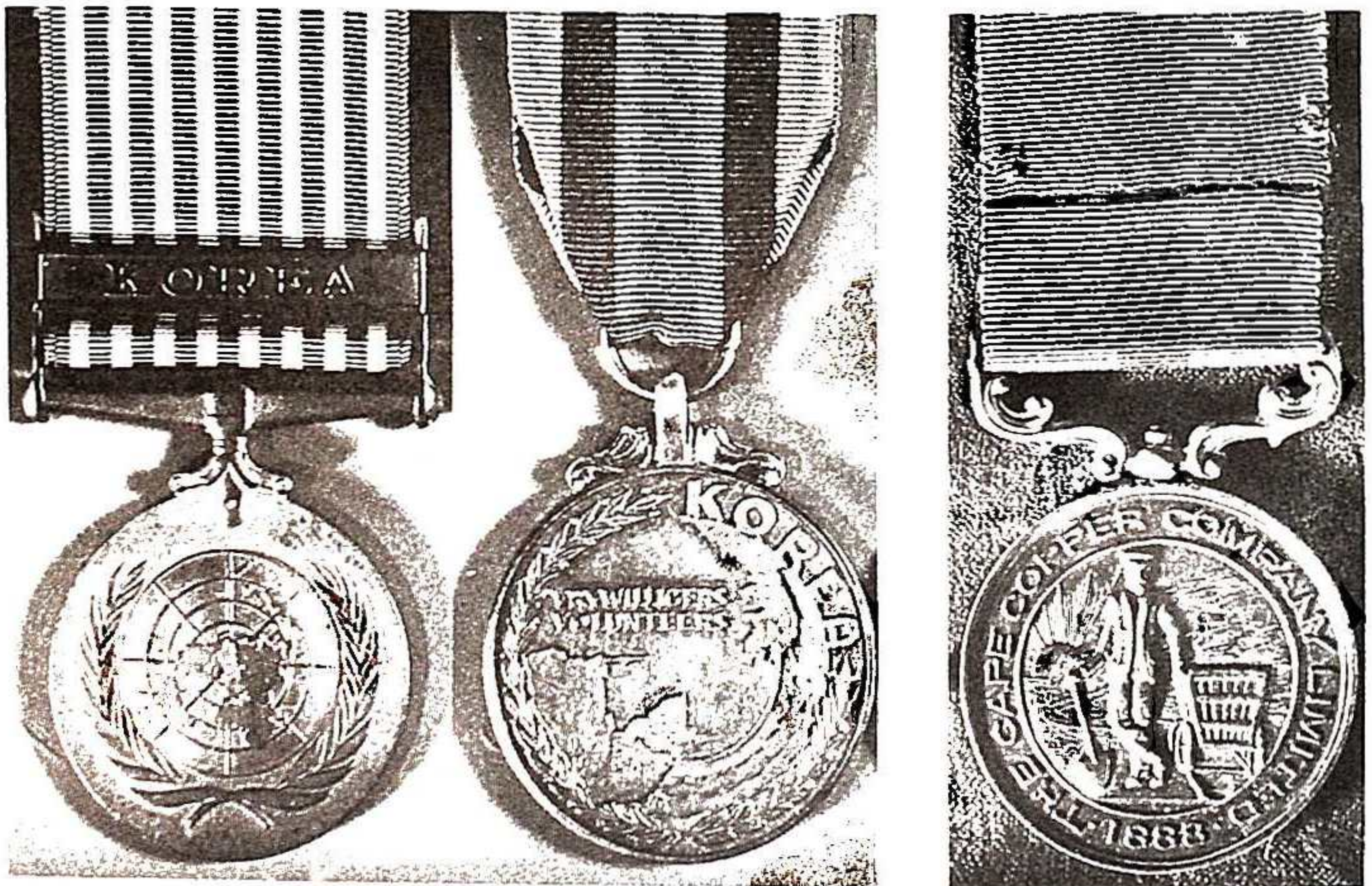
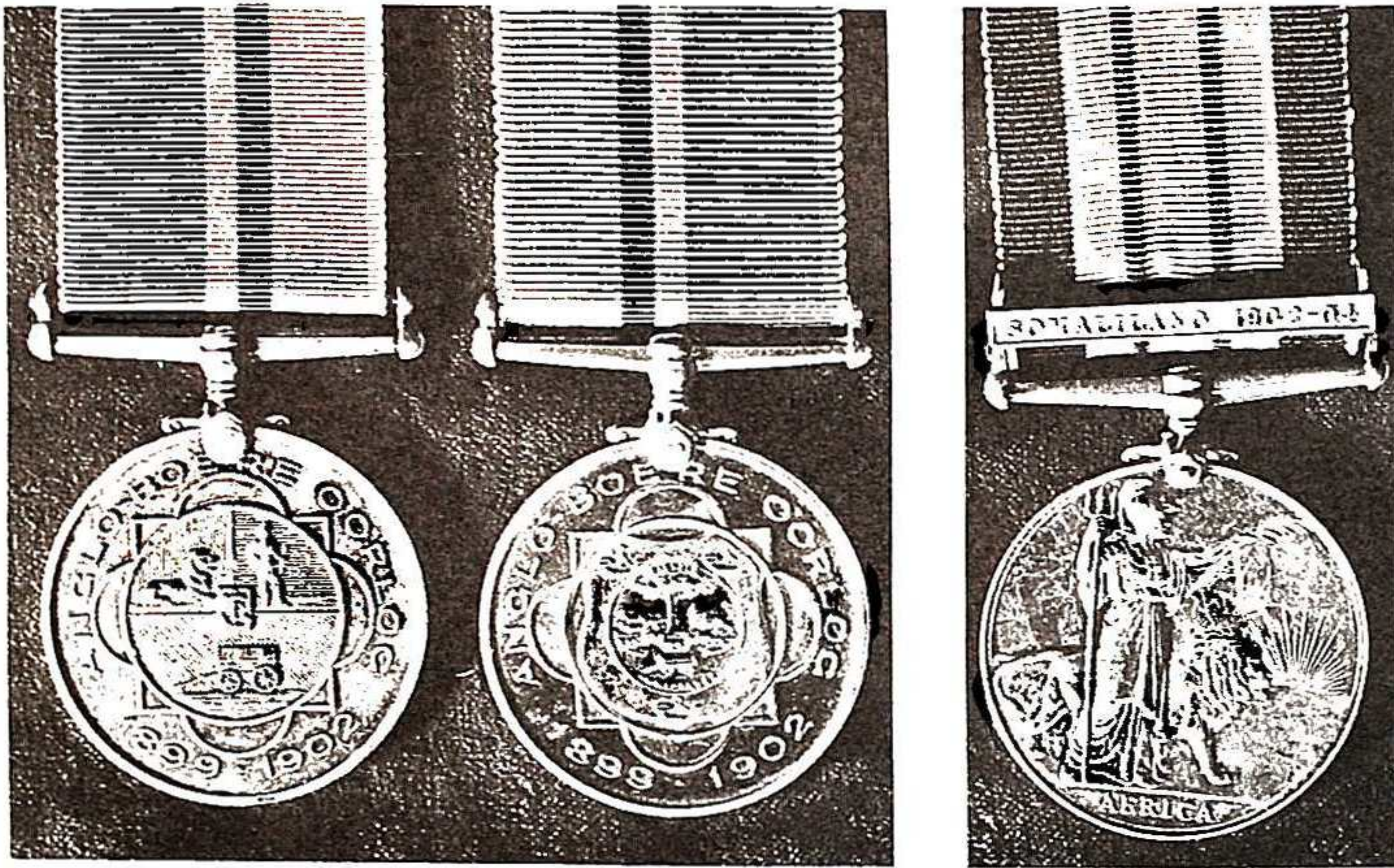
The possible number of different combinations of these bars is enormous, and no attempt can be made to list them here. The following points will however be of interest:-

- (1) If two or more bars were awarded, they should be found properly attached to the suspender in the same order as they are given above, reading from the bar nearest the medal, upwards.

(Occasionally bars issued late — especially the dated bars — are found apparently unofficially attached, or loose on the ribbon. Only verification with the medal rolls can authenticate these).

- (2) The two date bars, South Africa 1901, and 1902, were not awarded with the Queen's medal, if the recipient had also earned the King's South Africa medal.
- (3) The relevant "Colony" bar was not awarded if one of the bars

for an engagement in that particular Colony had been awarded.

(4) I believe the maximum number of bars (excluding the two dated bars) which was awarded with a single medal was eight. If one or both of the dated bars were awarded with the Queen's medal, the maximum becomes nine, or in one case of which I am aware, ten.

(5) In my experience, the minimum number of medals awarded to South African formations which are needed to ensure a collection which includes all 26 bars, is ten.

(6) Judged on total issues to ALL forces, British Imperial as well as Colonial, the scarcest bars are —

- (i) Defence of Mafeking
- (ii) Wepener
- (iii) Defence of Kimberley &
- (iv) Rhodesia, in that order.

To the collector who specialises only in medals awarded to South African units, however, I would say that in my experience, Belmont, Modder River and Talana are the bars which will give him most difficulty. They are very rare to South African units. Elandsplaagte is not far behind.

KING'S SOUTH AFRICA MEDAL, with swivel suspender.

- (i) Without bar

The King's S.A. Medal without bar is rare. But watch out for medals which have had bars removed.

- (ii) Bar : South Africa 1901 AND South Africa 1902

I have heard of a King's S.A. Medal with only one bar, South Africa 1901. This is contrary to the regulations governing the award of the medal, and if a genuine medal with only this one bar does exist, it must have been issued in error.

KING'S SOUTH AFRICA MEDAL, fixed suspender.

Fixed suspender probably late issue.

TRANSPORT MEDAL:

With bar : South Africa "1899-1902"
The Transport Medal was also issued with a bar "CHINA 1900" for the Boxer rebellion. A few medals with both bars do exist.

QUEEN'S MEDITERRANEAN

The Queen's Mediterranean Medal was issued, without any bar, to British troops who did garrison duty in the Mediterranean area during the Anglo-Boer War.
