Royal Mint Clamps Down on Sale of Churchill Crowns

The Royal Mint has no intention of issuing proof specimens of the unique Churchill Crown which is to be distributed in the United

The coin will be treated as a "normal coin of the realm" and will be available from British banks at the standard price of 5/- (50 cents).

It is the first time a commoner's head - that of the famed British Statesman, Sir Winston Churchill has appeared on any British coin and the rush by numismatists and hoarders to obtain the crowns is expected to equal the demand for silver American Kennedy halfdollars.

About 20 million Churchill Crowns will be minted.

ZAMBIA PLANS

20,000

PROOF CROWNS

Zambia will issue 20,000 cased proofs of its new 1965 commemorative crowns next month. The coin will honour Zambia's president, Dr. Kenneth Kaunda.

The crown will be released in conjunction with Zambia's first independence anniversary. The coin will contain nickel-silver (also called German Silver) alloy of copper, nickel and zinc. It will be legal tender in Zambia. This is the second proof issue from Zambia. A total of 5,000 proofsets (three coins dated 1964) struck by the Royal Mint were issued this They proved extremely year. popular and are already fetching high prices.

S.A. Mint has sent out First 1965 Sets

The South African Mint has sent out 500 of this year's proof sets during the past few weeks. At least 25,000 sets still have to be sent and they will be dispatched over the next four months.

The Mint officials are working overtime every Saturday, from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m., to send out the sets. The packing of the sets is done on a conveyor system, but because each set must be carefully handpacked to prevent damage and to ensure that each coin is perfect, the process is very long.

"We are handling the sets as quickly as we can," a senior Mint official said. "But we are getting hundreds of letters, from people wanting to know where their sets are and why there has been a delay. "The delay was fully covered in your coin magazine, yet people are still bothering us by letter and telephone. I do wish our customers would be patient. They should realize that the more letters and calls we have to answer, the less time there is to dispatch sets." The official said there had been more interest in this year's coinage than in any previous year in South Africa's history. The reason was two-fold: The Republic was changing its coinage and therefore the first issue was bound to be valuable in years to come; and

ANNOUNCEMENT

A recent announcement by the Royal Mint said: "There is no intention at present of issuing these coins in proof condition since the aim is to issue them as quickly as possible as normal coins of the realm. Proof pieces are slow to produce and expensive in manpower. We cannot, therefore, accept any orders for proof specimens of these coins.

"Proof sets of the United Kingdom coins are made very infrequently and the last occasion was in 1953 - the year of the Coronation of Her Majesty, the Queen. Any intention to issue proof coins (Continued on Page 3, Col. 3)

THERE'S A LOT TO LEARN **ABOUT FARTHINGS**

The South African %d was first minted in 1923 and it ended its existence in 1960. It has now disappeared from circulation, but fortunately there are still good specimens in the hands of private persons.

Perhaps future generations will look at this little coin and wonder if it was possible to buy anything for a symbolic aspect of coins which becomes meaningful and catches the imagination of collectors. A coin tells a story of the people in a particular ers. For instance, can you imagine what role the little British coin "A THIRD OF A FARTHING" played only 100 years ago? It is an attractive coin and has its value a third of a farthing - written on the reverse. Many spontaneous images of life 100 years ago come to mind when this piece of history is handled.

U.S. KIDS

A goal of every South African should be a complete collection of S.A Farthings. There is hardly an American youngster who is not proud to display his U.S. penny collection (cent). Acquiring a near complete set of Lincoln Head cents (1909 - 1965) is still relatively easy, but to collect Indian Head cents (1859-1904) already presents a great challenge. The really determined collector will set his sights on some of the Flying Eagle cents of 100 years ago. Luckily for South Africans a full set of S.A. farthings consists of only 33 coins (from 1923 to 1960). This excludes the 1926 farthing, when only "Proofs" were minted for Proofsets. In 1925/27/29 and 1940, no farthings were minted. The very scarce coins are the 1933, 1934 and 1936 dates when only 76, 52 and 43 respectively were struck. The chances of acquiring one of these are negligible.

plete when a collector has obtained the 30 available dates, excluding 1933, 1934 and 1936). You carry quarter of a penny. Yet it is the experience some difficulty finding the 1930 farthing since only 6,560 were struck. In most years millions were minted. However, the task is not impossible. Other dates which may give some trouble are 1923 (32,800). 1924 (94,838). 1928 (64,301), 1935 (60,786), 1937 (38,254) and 1941 (91,160). A conservative estimate by a senior official at the S.A Mint of the percentage of farthings already melter down, puts the figure at eighty % (80%). You must start immediately to complete a set, you should try to get the following coins:

Libya To Have

new Coins

this Month

The Bank of Libya has announced a new coinage issue under the 1963 Banking Law of that country. The new issue, which will consists of six coins, will be available from October 1.

Libya will be breaking with Indition and after the issue Piastres will no longer officially exist.

For the first time 100-millieme and 50-milliene coins will replace the existing 10 and 5 plastre notes. which will be withdrawn from circulation. Other denominations will be 20 mils., 10 mils., 5 mils. and one mil

NEW COIN

Division of the Libyan pound into 100 plasters of 10 mils. each is replaced by a division into 1,000 mils. The 50 mil. and 5 mil. coins will have picot edges - the first Libyan coins to have this shape. The obverses will bear Libya's national emblem and the words "United Kingdom of Libya" in Arabic.

The value of the coins will be written in Arabic and English. The Hegiru and Christian era dates will appear under the emblem. The reverse of the coins will have the emblem of two leaves which symbolizes agriculture. Coins valued at 10 mils. and over will be 75 per cent copper and 25 per cent nickel. The 5 mil. and one mil. coins will be 79 per cent copper. 20 per cent zinc and one per cent nickel. This is the first time there has been a major change in Libya's coinage. Perhaps it indicates Libya will soon open its doors to collectors.

again would no doubt be the subject of a special announcement.

"A Royal Proclamation was made on Tuesday, August 3, laying down the design of the Churchill Crown. The obverse will bear the uncrowned effigy of the Oween with the Royal Style and Titles and the date 1965, and on the revenue the effigy of Sir Winston Churchill with the word 'Churchill'.

ISSUE SOON

"The Queen's effigy will be that by Mrs. Gillick which appears on all other denominations of coinage. The reverse design is the work of Mr. Oscar Nemon.

"The crowns are expected to be issued in October and for some time afterwards. The Royal Mint is unable to deal direct with orders from private individuals or from organizations other than banks."

ARE BIG BUSINESS IN COINS

AMERICA

Coins are big business in most Western countries but in North America they are colossal business. A knowledgeable Canadian coin firm estimated recently that North American collectors spend R1.500 million annually on coins.

This fantastic figure is almost equal to the total budget for the tions minted outside the United Republic of South Africa. "Collectors Research Limited". of Montreal, Quebec, estimate that half this figure is coins withdrawn from circulation annually by collectors who want to complete their sets. This means that about R750 million is spent by collectors on their purchases from coin dealers. The prediction agrees with the authoritative Wall Street Journal which recently stated every American collector spent \$260 on coins.

"Foreign coins" - those denomina-States. This would average out at R195 per "foreign coin" collector in the U.S. "Unfortunately for those American dealers who carry stocks of foreign coins, about R80 million is sent out of the U.S. to dealers in other countries," the firm said. Footnote: It can be seen from these figures why the coins of one particular country rocket in price when the American numismatic spotlight falls on that country. This happened to South Africa about a year ago and the price of proof sets rose beyond recognition.

S.A.MINT WORKED FOR MANY COUNTRIES

- Last month I discussed collecting "minor" coins which do not cost the collector so much as Kruger ponds and other popular items. I suggested collecting by "Mints" and especially the coins struck by the S.A. Mint, Pretoria for "foreign" countries. We noted that, with the exception of the 1944 crown size 50 francs of the Belgian Congo these coins are not rarities and are therefore relatively cheap to acquire.

This month I intend to make a start with listing and describing some of the coins struck by the S.A. Mint for countries other than South Africa. They do not all have the "S.A." mint mark on them but they can be identified from the descriptions below:- (Complete list of these coins appears on the following page.)

With these facts in mind, we suggest you should set about assembling your set of coins. Now this won't be easy ... and if you go about it withou thought, it will mean cons capital outlay.




