### FROM THE PRESS

#### THE KRUGER "SINGLE NINE" UP FOR SALE

In 1899, during the Anglo-Boer War, the Transvaal Mint needed to produce a new coinage but lacked the necessary expertise to engrave new dies. The original dies for the gold pond, manufactured in Germany, had been seized en route by the British so it was decided to strike coins using the 1898 dies and overstamp them. Subsequently the Mint produced a solitary example of a gold pond with the date indicated on the obverse, below the bust of President Kruger, by a single figure 9 applied by a punch. However, it was not put into general production because the numeral was considered too large and impinged on the bust. Instead, a much smaller punch was used to apply the numerals 99.

The "Single Nine" coin, the greatest rarity among South African coins was formerly in the collection of King Farouk and over the years has been in the hands of various collectors in Britain and America but more recently was repatriated to South Africa. It is understood that the coin is currently on the market again, this time for the amazing sum of 7,000,000 Rand which will be a world record for a single coin. #### HORLOSIE TIK NOG NA SEWE JAAR IN PLAASDAM

STELLENBOSCH. Dit klink dalk soos die verhaal uit die pen van 'n advertensieskrywer, maar 'n plaaslike akademikus hét vandeesweek sy duur horlosie gevind nadat dit sewe jaar lank op die bodem van 'n plaasdam gelê het en dit werk nog.

Prof. Pierre du Toit, van die departement van politieke wetenskap aan die Universiteit van Stellenbosch, het sy Rolex-horlosie in 1985 in die dam verloor terwyl hy vir die Bergrivier-kanomarathon geoefen het.

"Ek het dadelik duiktoerusting geleen en saam met 'n vriend na die horlosie gesoek. Ons moes later tou opgooi," het hy gister gesê. Prof. Du Toit het egter nooit vergeet van die horlosie wat hy in 1970 vir R150 gekoop het nie. Dit kos vandag sowat R8 000. Die plaasdam is onlangs byna heeltemal leeggepomp en prof. Du Toit het besluit om sy soektog na sy Rolex voort te sit. Hy is bygestaan deur mnr. Giorgio dalla Cia, wynmaker van Meerlust en die eienaar van 'n gevorderde **metaalverklikker**.

Hulle het die horlosie uiteindelik gevind waar dit in 'n bars op die bodem gelê het.

"Behalwe vir 'n bietjie vog makeer dit niks nie. Ek het egter nie verwag dat dit sou werk nie," het prof. Du Toit gesê.

# RELIC HUNTING IN HEIDELBERG (GAUTENG)

As the sun rose over the horizen, the campsite was already a hive of activity. Horses were being saddled, rifles checked and cleaned and ammunition pouches filled. The Somersets were armed and well prepared for the morning patrol as the Boers had raided the farm Emmasdal just outside town the previous night.

In the days of the Anglo-Boer war, Heidelberg was the capital of the old Transvaal. It was of great importance for the British to occupy and secure Heidelberg for themselves. Heidelberg was also part of the main supply route from Durban to Pretoria. Thousands of British troops were stationed in and around Heidelberg during this period as the town became the front line and focus point of attention:

Close to a hundred years later, Mike Bull and myself were armed too. Mike with his trustworthy C-Scope 4XZ and myself with a Minelab Sovereign XS2 Pro. All this activity so long ago has made Heidelberg a detectorist's paradise.

After obtaining permission from the local town counsel to search on their property, Mike and I chose a site between Rensburg and Emmasdal where a British camp had been during the Boer war. Because of the "Scorched earth" policy the British had taken, the Boers were forced to replenish their supplies by stealing cattle, de-railing and robbing trains and even ambushing some British patrols. To protect their own cattle that was kept on the farm Emmasdal and also on the farm which belonged to a Mr van Rensburg, a camp was set up mid-way between the two farms.

Today there is a airfield for radio controlled planes where this camp once was. Mike chose to start his search on one of the runways and I just strolled of in the direction of the distant hills on which two Blockhouses are

Methodically swinging the coil from side to side, I soon got a good signal which according to the meter on the Sovereign indicated that I should dig. Carefully I started digging down, not directly over the pinpointed spot, but rather around it. The soil is extremely hard and I did not want to risk damaging my find. I looked to see where Mike was, and he too was already digging! At about 4 inches the soil was loose enough for me to start feeling around. Out came a beautiful brass uniform button with coat of arms and all. (Photo1, 2 and 3)

In the mean time, Mike had unearthed a 1900 One Shilling in excellent condition. (Photo 4 & 5) Mike then started searching in an outward spiralling circle from where the coin came. (After filling the hole again) Soon he was digging away again! This time it was a button like I had found.

I also searched in the outward spiral pattern from where my find came. It seemed like ages before the threshold tone was broken. This time the meter reading indicated a find with the "signature" of a coin. My heart skipped a beat as I held a 1896 ZAR 2 Shilling in my hand.

I was the first person to hold this coin in nearly 100 years! (Photo 6A & 6B)

Mike must have seen the excitement and came in my direction. He suddenly stopped dead in his tracks. Knowing Mike's expression, I could tell the C-Scope sang music in his ears. He started digging carefully after looking at my coin. In anticipation I waited to see what he had found. From a depth of about 7 inches came a well preserved cap badge (Photo 7). Both Mike and I were grinning from ear to ear. We had found a "hot spot"

As the day went on, our finds pouches became fuller and fuller with all sorts of interesting finds. I had also found a small badge (Photo 8 & 9) as well as a 1900 Victorian One Shilling in the same good condition as Mike's (Photo 4 & 5).

We had a wonderfull day out in the open with the added bonus of good finds.

What type of day the British or Boer soldiers had, we will never know, but what I do know is that we had done no harm nor suffered any. The soldiers came and went, and so Mike and I will return to this productive site to search again for items lost 100 years ago.


How long have I been detecting?

fact when we first started I didn't own a car but I possessed a metal detector!!!!! and I would go on my bike and detect in the parks and at open spaces.



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
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#### How many machines do you own?

#### How many hours do you give to the hobby?



Wat sekere items betref, het ek gedurende die eerste tydperk "beter" gedoen, en wat ander betref, weer swakker, <u>maar die verhoudings bly tog redelik konstant.</u> Gebaseer op bogenoemde inligting, kan ek dus met redelike sekerheid die getal, en tipe, items voorspel wat ek in die toekoms gaan vind. Die geheim is dus dat ek bloot my muntvondste moet opstoot, en die "goodies" sal gevind word, en wel in 'n redelik voorspelbare mate.
