
Banknote Rarity Study South Africa 1921-Date

Issued and Replacement Notes

What is the Pick Number?

People refer to a "Pick Number" and you'll see numbers starting with a letter "P" listed next to banknote descriptions. The Pick Number refers to numbers used by Albert Pick in 1975 when he published the first copy of the Standard Catalog of World Paper Money.



The Pick number can also have a **suffix** at the end, like P#123c. Unlike prefixes, suffixes are in **lowercase**. The following suffixes may appear:

"a", "b", "c", etc. suffixes (e.g., P#123a, P#123b,
 P#123c...): For each issue date of the same banknote.

1. This is the first 20 Pounds banknote issued by the South African Reserve Bank in September 1921.

2. The obverse was printed in English, while the reverse is in Dutch.

3. With only 125,000 notes printed, this note is considered extremely rare.

4. I have never seen this note, but an ungraded note in Fine condition has sold on Spink Auctions during 2013 at GBP 3700.

5. A C/2 series was printed but destroyed after a decision was taken to make changes to the design of the note.

6. Only one note, a Specimen has been graded by PMG.

The actual note C/1 018196 sold by Spink in 2013.

1. This note was printed in English on the obverse and Dutch on the Reverse.

2. With only a total of 2,734 notes printed, this note is considered extremely rare in any condition. I have never seen any of these notes myself, nor have I ever seen one on auction and question whether any of these even survived.

3. Prefix D/2 was printed but destroyed after a decision was made to change the design on the note.

4. No notes of any type graded by PMG.

5. Specimens exist as illustrated in Hern p 34.





1. With this issue, the Reserve Bank introduced a new design.

2. All notes were bilingual with English predominating over Dutch.

3. Even though 3,000,000 notes were issued, I believe very few samples have

survived, making this issue extremely hard to find in any condition.

4. Specimen banknotes do exist for this banknote.

5. Only 4 notes graded by PMG.





Pick 82b

1. With this issue, Afrikaans replaced the Dutch language on the banknote.

2. This note was dated 2 April 1932 but was overprinted with the date 17 November 1931 due to the announced retirement of WH Clegg as Reserve Bank Governor at the end of 1931.

3. This banknote is considered extremely scarce in any condition.

- 4. 800 00 notes were printed.
- 5. Only 7 notes graded by PMG.





Pick 82c

1. With this issue, Afrikaans replaced the Dutch language on the banknote.

2. The remaining 200,000 banknotes in this issue and E/12 prefix were all dated 17 November 1931.

3. With only 200,000 banknotes printed, this banknote is considered extremely rare.

4. Specimen banknotes do exist for this banknote.

5. Only 1 Note graded by PMG. (My collection), illustrated above.



1. In this issue, the reverse of the 1 Pound banknote saw a new design.

2. With only 1,000,000 notes printed in this issue, this note is extremely hard to find in any condition.

3. Only 2 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 84d

- In this issue, the South African Reserve Bank became the first organization in the world to introduce a banknote with a metallic thread as a security feature in the paper of a banknote.
- 2. Only 7 notes graded by PMG.



1. This issue saw a new design on the Reverse of the 5 Pound banknote.

2. With only 1,000,000 notes issued, this note is hard to find in any condition.

3. Only 7 notes have been graded by PMG.





Pick 89a

1. This issue introduced a new design for the 100 Pound banknote.

2. In this issue, Afrikaans replaced the Dutch language on the note.


3. The note, however, still had a security print in the Dutch language.

4. With only a total of 5,000 notes printed, this note is considered extremely

rare in any condition. Personally, I have never seen any of these notes, nor have I seen one on auction. Hern illustrates note D/3 003579.

5. Very few must have survived.





Pick 89b

1. In this issue, the Dutch security print on the note was removed.

2. With only 20,000 notes issued, this note is considered extremely scarce.

3. Only 3 notes graded by PMG, the above note is a 64 example in my collection.



Pick 90b

1. With this issue, the Reserve Bank reverted to normal thickness of paper.

2. They also started making use of paper treated with Melamine for all banknotes. Specimen banknotes do exist for this issue. (1 note graded by PMG).

3. Only 6 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 91b

1. With Prefix A/21 all notes were printed on thicker paper. Only 1,000,000 notes were issued with this prefix, making this note hard to find in any condition.

2. Only 3 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 91c

1. With this issue, the Reserve Bank reverted to normal thickness of paper.

They also started making use of paper treated with Melamine for all banknotes.

2. Specimen banknotes do exist for this issue. (3 graded by PMG.)

3. Only 3 issued banknotes graded by PMG.





Pick 92a

1. With this issue, the South African Reserve Bank issued a new design for the 1 Pound banknote.

2. Prefix B/23 should be English over Afrikaans, but there exists a specimen note which is Afrikaans over English.

3. Only 7 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 92b


1. With this issue, the Reserve Bank reverted to printing notes on thinner paper again.

2. Only 4 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 93a

- 1. With this issue, the South African Reserve Bank issued a new design for the 1 Pound banknote.
- 2. Only 7 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 93c

1. With this issue, the Reserve Bank reverted to printing notes on thinner paper again.

2. Only 1 note graded by PMG. (In my collection)



Pick 93d

1. With this issue, the Reserve Bank started printing notes on paper treated with Melamine.

2. Only 7 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 94

- 1. This issue saw a new design in the 5 Pound banknote.
- 2. Only 4 notes graded by PMG.





Pick 96b

1. In this issue, the South African Reserve Bank reverted to normal paper not treated with Melamine.

2. The date format in this issue was changed to a numeric date format.

3. Only 5 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 100b

- This banknote forms part of the issue above.
 (Pick 100)
- 2. Krause Publications assigned a PICK number and suffix "b" to this note due to the "Cancelled" perforation.
- 3. Only 6 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 101b

- This banknote forms part of the issue above.
 (Pick 101)
- 2. Krause Publications assigned a PICK number to this note due to the "Cancelled" perforation.
- 3. Only 1 note graded by PMG.

Pick 106a

- This is the first R10 banknote issued by the South African Reserve Bank. E/A much scarcer than A/E.
- 2. Only 11 notes graded by PMG. (but only 4 in uncirculated grades)





Pick 109a

1. South Africa has established the South African Banknote Company and from this issue started printing banknotes in South Africa.

2. This issue saw a new design on the R1 banknote.

3. The old Jan van Riebeek watermark was now replaced with the Springbok.

4. Language predominated every Prefix or 1,000,000 notes.

5. Only 11 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 132b

1. Other than a new Governor and signature on the note, no design changes were made to the R200 banknote in this issue.

2. The South African Reserve Bank no longer release figures publicly on the number of banknotes printed. The prefixes above, as well as the estimated prints, are simply based on the prefixes that have been identified. Real print figures are expected to be much higher than that figure.

3. Only 10 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 141a

1. In this issue, Omron Rings were added to the obverse and reverse of the R100 banknote.

2. The South African Reserve Bank no longer release figures publicly on the number of banknotes printed. The prefixes given, as well as estimated prints, are simply based on the prefixes that have been identified. Real print figures are expected to be much higher than that figure.

3. Only 10 notes graded by PMG.

Replacement Rarities

REPLACEMENT IDENTIFIERS

Applying the serial number is usually the last printing step. Serialization is still done at most printers with old-style mechanical tumblers in large, complex numbering box systems. If a serial number is used on a defective note during printing, it is used and cannot be re-used. That note is sequestered and must be replaced by a genuine and perfect note. Some printers create a set of 'Z' series notes with the replacement serial numbers, while the USA has used stars to identify replacement notes.

These notes are relatively rare and central banks don't seem to put out statistics on their frequency of errors and replacements. A reasonable estimate is 1 - 4 notes per 100,000 notes. This rarity makes the replacement notes interesting and valuable to collectors.

2. With only 30,000 replacement notes printed, this note is scarce in any condition.

3. Only 1 note graded by PMG (In my collection, illustrated above)

- 1. Replacement Banknotes were printed with the purpose of replacing error or faulty banknotes identified during the printing process.
- 2. Only 5 notes graded by PMG.



Pick 103a*

1. Replacement Banknotes were printed with the purpose of replacing error or faulty banknotes identified during the printing process.

2. With only 30,000 replacement notes printed, this note is scarce in any condition.

3. Only 1 note graded by PMG. (In my collection)



Pick 104a*

1. Replacement Banknotes were printed with the purpose of replacing error or faulty banknotes identified during the printing process.

2. With only 85,000 notes printed, this note is considered extremely scarce

3. Only 1 note graded by PMG. (In my collection)



Pick 104b*

1. Replacement Banknotes were printed with the purpose of replacing error or faulty banknotes identified during the printing process.

2. Prefix Y/4 only had 320,000 notes issued and these are harder to find.

3. Only 5 notes graded by PMG.

1. Replacement Banknotes were printed with the purpose of replacing error or faulty banknotes identified during the printing process.

2. With only 85,000 notes printed, this note is considered extremely scarce.

3. Only 4 notes graded by PMG.

2. Only 4 notes graded by PMG.

- 2. Only 5 notes graded by PMG.




Pick 111a*

1. Replacement Banknotes were printed with the purpose of replacing error or faulty banknotes identified during the printing process.


